We recognize that survival crime is at a all time high and we believe we can reduce these incidences by this project. So its the most vulnerable, the homeless who will be receiving honorarium.

The Active Cranbrook Physical Literacy Society (ACPLS) project will provide awareness, education and practical experience on physical literacy to a variety of organizations in Cranbrook and the geographical region. Physical literacy is how humans interact with their physical environment and includes agility, balance, coordination and stability as fundamental skills that assist anyone to participate in and perform physical tasks, including activities of daily living (ADLs) as well as recreational and sports activities.

The project will provide physical literacy kits, including a variety of basic equipment like floor dots, rope and floor "ladders", balls, and cloth material to use in demonstrations and for organizations to develop enjoyable physical play activities and games to promote healthy social play in their space. By reaching out to various organizations, including, government, business, recreational and social groups in our community and area, we will increase the general awareness and uptake of healthy physical activity and assist in promoting and building a more health aware community.

The success of Mobility Enhancement at Western Financial Place (WFP), and the Child Development Centre's Preschool Action Kits, have demonstrated the need and potential of creating a more physically literate and physically functional community. Travel Assistance Program for Family Caregivers

The project "Travel Assistance Program for Family Caregivers" would provide gas and meal vouchers to low income family caregivers who are driving senior's to medical appointments out of community, or to visit their senior loved one who is placed in long term care out of community on the "first available bed" policy. The Caregivers Network supports over 200 family caregivers throughout the East Kootenay, and at minimum another 200 senior care recipients who benefit from our support. In a recently conducted needs assessment, we have determined that approximately 1/3 of our clients are low income and struggling with the cost of caring for a loved one.

We would like to invite our low income clients to register in this travel assistance program on an individual as needed basis. We have six paid staff in the largest communities in the East Kootenay each with their own client base and means to distribute gas and meal vouchers. We would provide low income clients with meal and gas vouchers to help offset the cost of caregiving for a senior loved one needing to travel out of community.

Collective for Lower Elk Aquifer Restoration (CLEAR)

Story Map: Investigating Water Balance in South Country

The proposed story map will build on the results of a water availability, water balance and water quality study to be conducted for CLEAR by MacHydro - a hydrology consulting company in Cranbrook. This study will research and compile existing information regarding South Country ground and surface water to ensure CLEAR and the broader community residents, area users, funders and decision makers have an evidence based, accurate understanding of our water situation currently and going forward. A technical report to be produced by MacHydro as part of the existing study will be used as the basis for the proposed story map. The story map will be an essential means to communicate an accurate common understanding of our water system to a broad audience. This understanding is key to informed decision making as CLEAR continues to engage the broader community and partners to address diminishing water resources.

The main tasks are:

- arrange the data contained in the technical report to be produced by MacHydro for CLEAR.
- identify main conclusions.
- assemble into a storyline.
- physically put story map into ArcMap. (ArcMap is a computer program used to represent geographic information as a collection of layers and other elements (e.g. text, photos, graphics) in a series of maps.

Wild Voices for Kids supports school-based environmental education in the Columbia Basin by connecting pre K-12 teachers and students to hands-on presentations and field-studies, based on the local environment. These presentations and field-studies are created and delivered by community educators who are experts in their field, including biologists, ecologists, geographers, foresters, mountain guides, and cultural liaisons. The goals of the Wild Voices program include:

- 1. Assisting teachers in reaching their curriculum goals in engaging and innovative ways.
- 2. Facilitating learning opportunities that foster ecologically literate students.
- 3. Providing access to environmental learning for students and teachers in the Columbia Basin through at least 100 fully subsidized and 100 heavily subsidized presentations each school year, with unlimited presentations available at slightly subsidized rates.

Since 2008, students across the Columbia Basin have received curriculum-linked presentations and hands-on field studies through Wild Voices. Funding would be used to cover honoraria for Community Educators delivering presentations and bussing expenses for student travel to field-based studies for Wild Voices presentations delivered to students in RDEK.

Columbia River Headwater Lakes Monitoring and Education

The Lake Windermere Ambassadors and Columbia Lake Stewardship Societies are joining forces to strengthen the protection of the Columbia River headwater lakes by implementing the Columbia River Headwater Lakes Monitoring and Education Project. The project will build on our baseline data gathering information on the lake's water quality, quantity and vulnerable aquatic species populations in the lakes. The primary activities of this project include water quality and quantity monitoring of Columbia Lake, Lake Windermere, tributaries, and the upper reaches of the Columbia River. It also involves promoting the protection and restoration of shorelines, participating in species surveys and monitoring, and facilitating community education and outreach initiatives. The data collected will inform decision-making, governance, and restoration efforts in the headwaters region. We engage with the community through various initiatives, such as providing opportunities for citizen science water monitoring, participating in community invasive weed pulls and community cleanups, and delivering community educational programs, including outreach booths, workshops, in-school sessions, and summer camps. By sharing information with stakeholders, we aim to create collective action to preserve the freshwater ecosystems and natural environment of the Columbia River headwaters. By enhancing community knowledge of water resources, we aim to empower citizens and decision-makers to take proactive measures to safeguard the headwater lakes, benefitting ecosystems and communities now and in the future.

Cranbrook Food Recovery - Food Workbees

Cranbrook Food Recovery (CFR) partners with local grocery stores, bakeries and restaurants to recover food that is still edible, but no longer valuable for sale. We also recover produce from farmers in Creston.

CFR then distributes the majority of that food to community organizations. Anything that is no longer human grade is donated to local farmers for livestock feed.

Our chef also uses a portion of recovered food to create 450 meals every week. Meals are distributed to the homeless shelter, to the Salvation Army, and distributed weekly to anyone who who needs or wants frozen, ready-to-eat meals.

In the summer and fall, we have made impromptu trips to Creston to recover produce they can't sell, but also can't store. Last year we recovered 3500lbs of locally grown (delicious) fruit and veg, and brought it back to be distributed freely within Cranbrook and Kimberley.

This funding will allow us to hold weekly workbees that invite community members to join us in processing food. These will be social, inclusive 2-hour events, and will focus on how to preserve ingredients for future cooking use. We will also purchase a sealer that allows us to transition ready-to-eat community meal packaging away from single-use tinfoil to a sealable heat-resistant compostable package.

Redesign and Accessibility Upgrades to Receiving and Distribution of Donated and Recovered Food

A PROGRAM OF

This project is to update the current equipment we use for the receiving and distribution of food to increase both safety and efficiency at the Cranbrook Food Bank. These upgrades will also make many areas of the Food Bank more accessible to our diverse team of over 80 volunteers.

Beginning in June 2024, we will switch some of our table scales to floor scales. This will allow carts to be rolled onto the scales, increasing efficiency and decreasing the risk of injury from improper body mechanics. We will also upgrade carts in our warehouse and operational area. We will purchase an adjustable-height cart to accommodate our volunteers with diverse abilities. The addition of an electric pallet jack for the receiving of shipments and large donations will also increase our efficiency and make it safer for volunteers to move pallets of food.

We will implement this project by purchasing the equipment from suppliers both locally and online and then we will switch out the new equipment for the older equipment that needs replacing. We will provide in-person training for all the volunteers and employees who will be using the equipment and will include the training in our volunteer manual.

We will have all the equipment purchased and the volunteers trained by the end of August 2024.

The Cranbrook Lacrosse Association(CLA), is a vibrant, non-profit organization that has seen substantial growth over the last 8 years, more than tripling the number of youths registered in lacrosse during that time. The growth is directly related to the development model that has been adopted by our Association that ensures registration costs are kept low in order to keep the sport of lacrosse accessible and inclusive for the engagement of all youth. With tremendous growth and limited revenue generated from registration fees the CLA has not had the opportunity to upgrade and replace some of the key equipment required to run our lacrosse program and with the addition of a new turf for the Memorial Arena, we now require the ability to maintain the cleanliness and integrity of the turf. The project involves the acquisition of new goalie equipment, lacrosse goals, youth lacrosse sticks, shot clocks and an industrial vacuum for the turf. In acquiring these items, the CLA will be able to improve the quality of outdated, worn-out equipment, ensure enhancement of our school program, and ensure that all current safety standards are met. The addition of the turf to our program last year was a substantial purchase but to maintain the integrity and cleanliness of the turf surface the purchase of an industrial vacuum is essential.

The Cranbrook Pickleball Club will be completing the installation of sound barrier to the fencing on the west side of the Kinsmen Pickleball Courts. Acoustiblok, is the highest rated sound barrier available and has been used with great success across North America. Installation of this sound barrier to the fencing on the north side of the courts in 2022 was very successful in reducing the noise to the adjacent neighbourhood. We would like to give the residents west of the courts, the same benefits of noise reduction.

As well as providing the highest possible noise reduction, the installation of Acoustiblok on the west side will improve the aesthetics of this City of Cranbrook facility.

As was done with the first phase, the fencing will be reinforced with a concrete and metal bracing system to maintain the structural integrity after the addition of the very heavy sound barrier material. All costs associated with this portion of the project will be covered by The Cranbrook Pickleball Club, including materials and installation.

East Kootenay Range Tenure Invasive Plant Program

The Project's objective is to support range stewardship and invasive plant management activities on Crown land range tenures. To achieve this, EKISC focuses on two components:

- 1. Invasive plant management (inventory, treatment, monitoring, data entry).
- 2. Outreach (delivery of workshops, learning events, resource development).

The primary component of this Project is invasive plant management. EKISC works with Crown land range tenure holders to administer strategic invasive plant treatments on public rangelands (i.e., ranchers are paid to treat invasive plants on their range tenures). Treatments are in alignment with Provincial priorities to ensure a landscape level approach, and help the range tenure holder increase forage availability for livestock. Management activities include mechanical or chemical work through application of approved herbicides. EKISC assists project participants with receiving the necessary education (e.g., attending Pesticide Applicators Certificate course, invasive plant identification) and training required to safely and effectively apply herbicides.

The project enables ranchers to stay on top of existing and new invasive plant infestations (e.g., support forage availability/retention), and improves land stewardship on range. Treatments are monitored to ensure efficacy and completion, and data is entered into the Provincial database. EKISC also delivers education and outreach activities to the ranching/agricultural community.

This project will promote increased environmental stewardship and positive behaviour change for invasive species prevention. Strategic Invasive Plant Control of Leafy Spurge (SIPCOLS)

The goal of the SIPCOLS Project is to work collaboratively with area stakeholders to decrease infestation levels and prevent new introductions of Leafy spurge (LS) in the upper Columbia Valley. LS is an aggressive invader that can result in decreased commercial land values, reduced cattle stocking rates and income for farmers, and a reduction to recreation and tourism values associated with BC's landscapes.

EKISC will work with project partners to develop a strategic, comprehensive workplan that will focus on managing existing infestations and reducing the risk of spread into high value adjacent lands. The collaborative approach will result in leveraged funds and cost savings for project partners.

Objectives:

- 1. Inventory LS sites in the project area.
- 2. Create a comprehensive, multi-stakeholder LS management plan, focusing on areas of high habitat value and pose the greatest threat to adjacent land managers (Wildlife Management Areas, conservation lands, Shuswap Band lands, agricultural lands).
- 3. Treat identified high-priority infestations within 1km of private land within the project area. Additional treatments areas, funding permitting, will include:
- Infestations on Crown land near the CWWMA to prevent further spread of LS away from main areas of infestation.
- Infestations that are adjacent to Shuswap Band lands to assist with on-reserve treatments.
- 4. Communicate importance of LS control to stakeholders and community members within the Columbia Valley.

Elk River Floodplain Restoration

The Elk River Alliance seeks ReDi support for purchasing fencing supplies and watering systems to support streambank restoration on three historical pasture fields along the Elk River. In 2024-25, work will focus on installing protective fencing, watering systems and revegetation along 600 m of Elk River streambank. Two sites are located between Elkford and Sparwood: The 'Big Ranch' and 'Elk River Lodge'. The third 'Morrissey Meadows' site is located 18 km south of Fernie.

Livestakes (cut branches) and seedlings of cottonwood, red osier dogwood, and willows will be collected from existing groves. They will be re-planted within 10 m of the riverbank to produce dense barrier vegetation. A watering system will be installed to maintain soil moisture for two years, which will allow the plants to create a viable self-sustaining root network. Temporary fencing will be installed to protect young plants from herbivores.

The project will stabilize banks, restore terrestrial and aquatic habitats, and improve flood resilience. Dense roots will trap soil and stones and allow the bank to resist water erosional forces naturally. Riparian vegetation will is also vital for a healthy habitat for mammals, birds, and fish. This work will forward a long-term goal of developing a functional floodplain forest ecosystem on the sites, and connect the floodplain corridor along the Elk Valley.

Power Plateau Trail Improvement and Extension

A proposed improvement and extension to the existing Power Plateau trail in Lois Creek Trails will provide users with a new route to access the Legion Ridge trails including Barts, Tighty Whitey, Totem and Legion Ridge. The project is to improve an existing section of the Power Plateau trail and to build a new trail crossing the Powerline trail at the west end above a proposed wetland area. This will relieve foot and bike traffic pressure on the Powerline trail where it is thick with invasive plants including Spotted Knapweed and Blueweed. When completed, the project should help to reduce the spread of invasive plants further into the trail system. The new route will be constructed by Kimberley Trails Society to a gentle "stroller-grade" standard similar to the popular Power Down and Power Up trails built by KTS (with assistance from Wildsight crews) last year, further enhancing access to Lois Creek Trails for families with young children. Trail users currently climb the Legion Ridge escarpment at a 13 to 15% grade. The new alignment (in red on the attached map) will reduce that grade to about 8%. The concept line includes about 500m of improved trail (Power Plateau) and 650m of new trail (not yet named).

Water Monitoring for Local Climate Change Adaptation

Living Lakes Canada has developed an innovative methodology to gather the data and information necessary to build climate resilience in the Columbia Basin. We are implementing a coordinated water monitoring network that reflects local priorities while also addressing scientific data gaps.

In 2022, we implemented this approach in the RDEK within the Columbia-Kootenay Headwaters Hydrologic Region and the Elk River Valley which is part of the Upper Kootenay Hydrologic Region. In 2023 we expanded to the rest of the Upper Kootenay region (map attached). Activities include monitoring of stream flow; water temperature; climate; high elevation ecosystems; groundwater, wetland and lake level; water quality and biodiversity at 42 locations across the RDEK.

To support local capacity building and youth engagement in water monitoring and stewardship, we offer community workshops and training on water monitoring protocols, volunteer opportunities, internships and employment opportunities.

The monitoring network is capturing critical long-term data to support community and ecosystem resilience in the face of climate disruption. The improved knowledge of our watersheds will support local climate adaptation and water stewardship initiatives.

M2BL Trap and Release (TNR) Expansion

Meant 2B Loved Pet Rescue Society's pivotal project aims to enhance and sustain our Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program. Currently M2BL is the sole registered domestic animal rescue conducting this service in the East Kootenay. In 2023, we were involved with well over 200 spays and neuters, with at least half attributed to TNR efforts. However, we are hindered by the absence of suitable recovery spaces for feral cats post-surgery. Managing feral cats demands specialized care, and our few volunteers equipped to provide that care quickly become overloaded.

Our project centers on acquiring a dedicated piece of land, providing a location for 30 individual cat containment units. These units will serve as safe havens for feral cats during their recovery period or for kittens rescued from feral environments being treated for health issues. By addressing this critical gap in infrastructure, our organization can substantially improve the efficiency and impact of the TNR program. With the generous support of the ReDi Grants, New Dawn Development, FR Rentals, and skilled volunteers, we anticipate purchasing a plot of land and completing the construction of cat containment units on-site by June 30, 2025. Simultaneously, M2BL will hold a fundraising campaign to fund construction of a small building on the land which can be used to house animals with nowhere else to go for a short term.

The Community Garden is open to the public to utilize (plant, maintain, harvest) and is designed primarily as a demonstration garden, where residents can come to learn growing techniques, composting and other garden-related knowledge. The Backyard Farmer Program uses backyard space, volunteered by yard owners, to grow vegetables (mainly high-yield/high-value leafy greens such as spinach, kale and chard). The concept is based on the urban farming method known as SPIN (Small Plot INtensive), which takes advantage of urban conditions-like warmer ambient temperatures, readily available water sources, yard fencing for protection from wildlife, etc.-to maximize quality and quantity of vegetable produce.

All of the produce from both programs which is not consumed by the public is delivered to the Kimberley Food Recovery Depot (KFRD) and the Kimberley Helping Hands Food Bank (KHHFB). KFRD has also expressed an interest in having their volunteers assist in harvest and delivery. Seasonal Snow Storage

This project involves clearing a small area (approximately 0.5 Ha) at the ~42 km point on the Forster Service Road where snow scavenged at the end of the winter season will be stored through the summertime by insulating it with a thick layer of sawdust. This stored snow will, at the start of the winter-season be pushed into the frozen river to form a seasonal snow bridge allowing mechanized access to the remainder of the winter trail to the cabin. This will allow for an earlier start to grooming as compared to waiting for sufficient snowfall in the current season to facilitate a snow bridge. Note sufficient snowfall accumulation has been delayed further and further into the winter season. By way of reference as of the submission of this proposal at the end of January 2024 there is insufficient snow to develop the snow bridge.

Without the snow bridge there is approximately 1 km of trail which does not get groomed and becomes very difficult to traverse. This is a major deterrent to using the Forster Recreation Area.

Windermere Valley Snowmobile Society

Transportable Snow Grooming Equipment

This project involves the purchase of a snow groomer that is easily transportable via small trailer as well as an appropriate utility snowmobile to groom trails that WVSS has to date not been able to. While WVSS grooms the majority of the trail to the Forster Recreation site with its large dedicated groomer, it has not been able to groom snow on the trails to the Doctor Creek, Brewer Creek or Rocky Point areas. Additionally, a critical section of the Forster trail cannot be groomed until later in the season with the large groomer. When not groomed, these trails become very difficult if not impossible for snowmobilers to travel.

This project would eliminate this problem and profoundly increase the value that WVSS is able to offer the users of these trails by maintaining access to key recreation areas.

Additionally, WVSS would use this equipment to facilitate the maintenance of previously undeveloped snow trails on seasonally-out-of-service roads for skiers, snowmobilers, ice-fishers and other outdoor enthusiasts to recreate. It is intended that this use would start modestly in and around the Forster Recreation Site establishing a base of operations at the shelter proposed there.
